Switch heaters off if you are not in the room and when you go to bed, don't place them near materials that could catch light.

Keep all flammables away from the cooker and if you use a chip pan consider changing this for a deep fat fryer.

Have your chimney swept before use.

Have your electric blanket checked.

Keep all matches and lighters out of sight and reach of children.

A thatched roof is always at risk from fire. Once a fire has taken hold in a thatch it will spread rapidly.

It is interesting to note that older people, over 40s, were in the majority (51%) and that 66% of the people were there walking their dogs. 40% of the visitors to the Park live in Old Catton. It is great to know that 98% of those interviewed were satisfied with the facilities in the Park.

Trading Standards -Top Ten Tips for Christmas Shopping

Did you know you have no automatic right to a refund if you just change your mind? Or that you may have more rights when you buy from a catalogue than a shop?

If we all know our rights we can make better decisions and avoid some of the pitfalls of Christmas shopping. Using feedback from Norfolk shoppers, Trading Standards has put together a list of 10 top tips to help people have a merrier Christmas.

- 1 Unwanted presents Shops don't have to take things back unless there's something wrong with them but often help out of goodwill. Check before you buy and ask if they do gift receipts.
- Receipts Proof of purchase is very important if you do need to return anything. Put receipts in a safe place as soon as you start shopping.
- 3 Check it out -Check presents before you wrap them. This avoids upsets on Christmas day and helps you sort things out quickly with shops if there's a problem.
- 4 *Credit* Think about paying by credit card for goods over £100. You may get extra protection if things go wrong, but make sure you know the full cost and can afford the repayments.
- 5 Debt Don't let money problems pile up. You can check where to get free impartial advice at www.norfolk.gov.uk/managingyourfinances. We've created a booklet 'Looking to the future' which highlights some of the support available locally. Download it from the site or call 0344 800 8020 to get a copy.
- 6 Christmas shops Be very careful with "Christmas shops" and one-day sales that appear overnight. They often disappear just as quickly with no one left to complain to if things go wrong.
- Delivery If you're ordering presents, get written confirmation they'll be delivered in time. If you don't, you might get an estimated delivery date only and have to accept goods after Christmas.
- 8 Buying from home You have the right to change your mind with most things bought on line or by mail order. If you're buying over the internet, you also get protection against fraud if you pay by credit or debit card.
- 9 Fakes Watch out for cheap fakes as they're likely to be poor quality and could be unsafe. Common ones at Christmas are designer clothes, watches and perfume.
- Toys Stick to age warnings on toys and look for safety signs like the Lion mark. Make sure younger children don't get hold of toys made for older ones and check for loose parts or sharp points.

New land at Lavare Park

The size of Lavare' Park has increased dramatically thanks to the gift of another 2.38 hectares of land by the Norwich Consolidated charities. The new land has been cleared and the new grass has grown well and will be ready for football in 2011. There will be two new football pitches there, as well as the existing pitch. Because there is enough space, provision will be made to move the pitches by 24 feet each year to help with the wear in the goalmouths. The Council has decided to have the three 'big' pitches at Lavare' Park and three mini soccer pitches at the Church Street Recreation Ground next year. We think this will be helpful as the ground at Lavare' Park is better drained than at Church Street and we have no flexibility to move big pitches at Church Street as space is restricted.

The Council had been talking to the Old Catton Junior Football Club about the possibility of the Club leasing the land at Lavare' Park and managing it but the discussions have not resulted in any agreement about this yet. Oddly, the number of teams playing for the Club has reduced this year so the number of big pitches is now adequate but the need for extra mini soccer pitches still exists and can be catered for now we have the additional land.

There will be a new entrance to Lavare` Park and another car park when the housing site is developed but we do not know when this will be.

Budget for 2011/12

The Council was very mindful of the need to keep its budget increase as low as possible even though there will be significant increases in running costs, like electricity. It was decided to increase the precept by about 1%, which works out to about two pence a week for a 'band D' property.

3
