Annual Report 1st April 2022-31st March 2023

One might say that 2022/2023 could be summarised in two words – Deer Park. The news of the sale of the land raised tense public opinions against any development on this site and it was good to see the community come together to express their objections and fight for the Park. The Parish Council continued to be against any development of the land and worked tirelessly to open discussions with the developer. Our announcement in March that the Parish Council had secured the purchase of the land was the icing on the cake – ensuring that this valuable Old Catton asset will now remain protected from any development in the future.

June marked the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the Parish Council were pleased to host the Fun Day Celebration at the Recreation Ground and the Picnic in the Park Event at Catton Park. The glorious weather ensured that footfall was high and with



free children's activities (zorbing, circus tricks, facepainting), children's fairground rides, craft and information stalls, netball demonstrations, raffles, chainsaw wood carving, bucking bronco and dance demonstration), it was clear that everyone thoroughly enjoyed the day event. Live music by Terry Adams, Felix, and Hayley Moss ensured the party in Catton Park was also a huge success. It was a wonderful way to bring together families and friends, neighbours and communities and I thank all who supported the event.



2022 recorded one of the hottest summers which provided many challenges for the management of our green spaces. Our Head Groundsman, Ross, together with our grounds staff worked tirelessly against the weather to ensure that all the Parish Council facilities were of the best standard we could

provide in the circumstances. Bowls and cricket continued to be enjoyed by our resident teams, equipment was maintained, maintenance was carried out. The grounds staff team are to be commended for the work they carry out at all the facilities the Council are responsible for – the Cemetery, the Churchyard, Woodham Leas, the War Memorial, Lavaré Park, the Village

Pond and the Recreation Ground. We are sure all residents will agree that, thanks to the staff's efforts, Old Catton remains a beautiful and well-maintained village. My personal thanks to Ross, Chris and Darren for their hard work during this year.

During the year we have continued to make improvements around the Parish; the trod surface on Oak Lane has been tarmacked (funding provided through the Parish Partnership Scheme), new noticeboards have been installed at Morrisons and Repton Avenue bringing the total number of noticeboards around the village to eight, replacement tree and hedging has been installed and, through S106 funding, we have replaced the fencing on the tennis courts. The planting of the historic fruit trees at the green space at Woodham Leas, which will create a small community orchard, will soon be carried out.

At the time of writing we have just had Parish and District Councillor elections. Sadly we have a number of Councillors who have chosen not to stand this year for which we must give heartfelt thanks for their years of service to our Parish. We especially thank Ann Chandler and Brian Honess who have served as Councillors for more than a decade, for the time, effort and support they have given to the Parish and wish them well in their "retirement". We welcome two new Councillors to the Parish — John Arnott and Martin Callam — and welcome the contributions they will make to the Parish Council. Our congratulations also go to Councillors Karen Vincent, Ken Leggett and Richard Potter for their re-election as District Councillors for Old Catton and look forward to continuing our collaboration with them for the benefit of our residents.



This year the Parish Council has continued supporting our community. We provided a weekly "Warm Room" to residents during the Winter months — offering a warm welcoming space to those residents who were finding the energy and cost of living crisis difficult and have decided to continue running this as a "Warm Welcome twice a month for the foreseeable future. We also continue to support the Royal British Legion and provided display

windows for art as part of the Remembrance Display, Catton Park by hosting the annual Garage Sale and Friends of Catton Park through the selling of tickets for the Easter Egg Hunt and Open Gardens events and selling greeting cards.

The Council also proudly supports the youth of our community; through Sprowston Youth Engagement Project (SYEP) via the Old Catton Youth Group, through the LGBTQ weekly group and by supporting the Old Catton youth football team (U14s) who practise at the Recreation Ground on Tuesday evenings. We continue to welcome and support youth netball through the weekly practise session of Thoroughbred Netball held at the Recreation Ground, look forward to welcoming the Dynamos Cricket youth group who will be starting at the Recreation Ground shortly and continue to provide support to Old Catton Junior Football Club who use the Parish Council owned site at Lavaré Park.

With the restart of playing season we also welcome our sports groups back to the Recreation Ground – our three bowls clubs (Wensum, Catton and Old Catton teams), Old Catton Cricket Club and Thoroughbreds Netball have all returned to enjoy the facilities at the Reaction Ground and with the newly installed fencing, gate and online booking system we hope to increase tennis usage also. We are lucky to have such diversity of facilities at the Recreation Ground and it is a pleasure to see so many people using and enjoying them.

Looking forward to next year (2023-2024) — we started our community support with the celebration of the Coronation of King Charles III. The Parish Council hosted an all-day event at the Recreation Ground, there was a real Community spirit, visitors enjoyed watching the Coronation live on a giant screen, while children enjoyed funfair rides and free children's activities. Despite the rain later in the day, there was still a wonderful atmosphere with visitors singing and dancing in the rain to Terry Adams and friends who provided some excellent music. Plans for CIL/S106 expenditure on the Pavilions at Lavaré Park and the Recreation Ground and improvements to Buxton Lodge and the Church Hall will hopefully come to fruition by the end of 2023 with building works starting in 2024. These improvements will provide updated and improved facilities for our community to enjoy.





We would like to thank Norfolk County and Broadland District Councillor Karen Vincent and Broadland District Councillor Ken Leggett for their continued hard work and dedication to Old Catton and collaboration with the Parish Council for improvements to the Parish. 

CATTON PARK TRUST

This year saw Catton Park being awarded the Green Flag Community Award for a 6th year running. This award is the international quality mark for parks and green spaces acknowledging that the space boasts the highest possible

environmental standards and is beautifully maintained. Our Warden, Matt Caley, and Park Assistant, Amy Henderson, are to be commended for the impressive standard with which they continue to ensure the Park is maintained. We are honoured to have been awarded this Award again and hope we can maintain this standard for many years to come.



Throughout 2022 the Park has continued to see numbers of visitors increase significantly. Whether for pleasure, exercise, dog walking, family fun, cycling or to attend an event it is evident that Catton Park is now well-established as a Norwich Park that is worth visiting. High footfall has ensured that Catton Park has become known as a Park of high standard and we are immensely proud of the reputation Catton Park now affords.



Ongoing maintenance of the park and woodland continues to be carried out. Tree and shrub planting, woodland management, grass cutting, replacing fencing, improving the pond, extensive path maintenance and never-ending litter picking continues are just a few of the tasks carried out at the Park. Our regular volunteers (John, Ben and Jonathan) provide essential support to Matt and Amy in helping with these tasks and we give special mention and thanks to them.

This year brought some events to Catton Park. We hosted a very successful Upcycling Event in May and we are hopeful to repeat this in 2024. Circus CORTEX (containing Ukrainian and Russian performers) came to Catton Park in July and were a huge success. The hugely successful Picnic in the Park as part of the Parish Council's Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations took place in June with large numbers of attendees enjoying live music and the lighting of the Beacon. Larry Gray & Sons Fun Fairs visited the Park in September. Unfortunately and unforeseen this clashed with the sad passing of Queen Elizabeth II so, respectfully, opening days were restricted, however residents and visitors thoroughly enjoyed the rides on those days they were open. Sadly Strange Fascination Outdoor Theatre were unable to join us this year – due to the happy news of the birth of Simon and Daisy's first child. The Friends of Catton Park hosted the annual Lantern Parade

in October with a slightly longer walk starting from the Spixworth Road entrance – it was wonderful to see so many lanterns and children enjoying themselves, also the ever popular Easter Egg Hunt (with record number of children taking part).

MESSAGE FROM PC GRAHAM GILL

With the world returning to a new version of normality over the past year, my duties as a Beat Manager of engaging with the community in face-to-face street surgeries and meetings have been restored. I also attend local events, work on the priorities voted for by residents, and tackle any issues that arise.



Engagement surgeries are held at least once a month in Old Catton, which are advertised in advance on our website and social media, and the public are encouraged to come along to discuss local problems or simply have a chat. Thank you to everyone who has stopped by in the last year to do just that.

Every three months priority concerns in the community are discussed and amended to give focus to the patrol areas and partnership work we conduct. The priorities of anti-social behaviour (ASB) and speeding are often agreed upon in the public meetings, and work continues to address your concerns.

We have conducted high-visibility patrols around key locations and investigated reports made to us about ASB. Two suspects were recently identified and interviewed for such offenses. ASB is understandably a concern in most areas of Norfolk, but I'm pleased that there were very few reports of this nature in Old Catton since April 2022.

Speed checks are regularly carried out in the area, and joint operations with the Road Collision Reduction Team and Camera Safety Team have been successful in catching drivers travelling over the speed limit.

The latest Priority Setting Meeting, held in March 2023, saw a great attendance by Councillors and residents alike, with a positive response to the actions taken in the start of the year.

The church has continued to be busy and available for the highs and lows of life from weddings and baptisms to funerals. We had the joy of celebrating the Queen's platinum jubilee with a special service, although unfortunately later in the year we were open so that people could sign the book of remembrance for her passing. But once again we found ourselves celebrating as we held a special coronation service and refreshments for King Charles III.

There have been lots of opportunities to show case the hospitality of the church and its warm welcome as we held Christmas and spring fairs, lent lunches and harvest suppers. There is also knit and natter and the weekly (during term time) Coffee, Chat & Company which has moved into the Church Hall due to it needing more space.

It has been particularly great to have the church more involved with the local schools and to welcome Old Catton Junior and the Hall School into church for services and the uniformed groups such as the guides and scouts in to learn about the church and to help the Scouts obtain their faith badge. Christmas remains a great time to have young people in to have fun while learning the real reason for Christmas.

Of course, we continue to hold our weekly Wednesday 10am and Sunday 8am and 10am services as well as special services for key festivals and events. The church is also open during the day so that people can come and find a quiet place to sit to be still and perhaps light a candle in prayer. The church hall remains a resource for the community of Old Catton and welcomes a wide range of groups for their meetings including the monthly meetings of the Mother's Union and the Women's Group as well as the quarterly Men's Breakfast.

We hope that in the coming year the church and hall will continue to grow and support the people of the parish of Old Catton.



For the orchard, the invaluable support of Old Catton Horticultural Club, Liz and Denis in particular and funding/advice from Broadland DC and Norfolk CC. We are looking to enhance the orchard this year. If you would like to help, I'd love to hear from you.

Our third Lantern Parade takes place on Friday 20 October. Last year over 320 children, adults and dogs joined us on this free family parade from the Spixworth Road entrance, past the Church Street entrance and along the main track down to Buxton Lodge. Hot chocolate and bucket chips were enjoyed by many.

In November we look forward to our very popular Quiz Night! Our quiz returned earlier this year after the break due to Covid-19 with a slight change. Instead of fish and chips we served delicious home cooked chilli. As usual the teams competed hard with a very close finish.

Other events have included the Easter Egg Hunt in April in which 190 children took part — the biggest hunt yet! Children searched the woodlands for cardboard eggs which they exchanged for a chocolate bunny and a bun with squash. Last October our friends at ParkRun donated cakes and other baked goodies for a bake sale which raised a good amount of money. Early in May about 28 people joined us for an early morning bird walk followed by bacon baps and coffee in the Lodge. Despite the disappointing weather we spotted about 20 species. Later in May our Open Gardens event attracted over 115 visitors who enjoyed visiting six very different gardens in the lovely spring sunshine and homemade refreshments. Our thanks to Sarah and Gail at the Parish office for selling tickets on our behalf for these events.

Other ways to support the Park are to purchase packs of greetings cards. These packs comprise 6 cards featuring photographs taken in the Park by local residents. They are just £6 for a pack and are available from the Parish Council Offices in Church Street and at our events. Although not a Friends' initiative we are pleased to promote the glass recycling scheme in the village. If you pop your glass into the banks either at Morrisons or the Maids Head and Woodman pubs this raises money directly for the Park. You can also recycle card and paper at Morrisons. It's a bit less convenient than using the grey bins but really makes a difference.

Our thanks to all the volunteers who help at our events and in other ways — we could not do without them! Each volunteer is greatly valued and we appreciate their time. If you are interested in helping at any of our events you would be most welcome. Contact details below.


