Annual Report 1st April 2021–31st March 2022

Welcome to this year's Annual Report from your Parish Council.

The year started with the sad news of the death of Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, at the age of 99. Social distancing restrictions continued during the earlier part of the year and no one can forget the pictures of HRH The Queen sitting alone at Prince Phillip's funeral. Restrictions continued until February 2022, the knock-on effect being increased mental health issues and families facing financial issues into the next financial year. As a community I believe we have continued to thrive. The legacy of covid has been awareness of ones neighbour, in Old Catton we already promote this. Groups and societies, both established and new, provided support and wellbeing to those who just need a friend. I hope these support mechanisms continue for many years.

As a Parish Council we have aimed to continue supporting our community through these difficult times and our Council staff have continued providing support, guidance and assistance wherever possible alongside their normal working duties. I thank the staff for the dedicated service they continue to provide to our community.

During this year we have welcomed two new Members to the Council – Tim Cooke who joined us in July and Richard Potter (who was also elected as Old Catton Broadland District Councillor working alongside Councillor Karen Vincent and Councillor Ken Leggett) who joined us in September. We also said farewell to Sam Walker and wish him well in the future.

We said a fond farewell to Maureen Wilkin who has worked for the Council at the Recreation Ground and Lavaré Park for nearly 25 years. Maureen was the longest serving employee of the Council and her dedication and vigilance is missed. Christine Smith has stepped into Maureen's shoes at Lavaré Park and we hope she will have many happy years working with the Council. We also marked the sad passing of Malcolm Wilkin (a former Recreation Ground Supervisor) who passed away in November. He was known and loved by many.





It has been a busy year for the Council. A new trod has been installed across the land at Priors Drive which was funded by the Parish Council, Norfolk County Councillor Karen Vincent and through the Parish Partnership Scheme. We are planning the improvement of trod surface at Oak Lane (near the Catton Park entrance) through the Parish Partnership Scheme for next year. New noticeboards will be installed at Morrisons and Repton Avenue (by the path to the playground). This will bring the total number of noticeboards around the village to x8 (also on Church Street, St Faiths Road, Norman Drive, corner of White Woman Lane, George Hill and at the entrance to the Recreation Ground); the boards have an open side that residents are welcome to use to advertise their event/business/etc. Using Community Infrastructure (CIL) and S106 funds we have resurfaced and line marked the car park at the Recreation Ground which will hopefully make parking easier for those using the beautiful

green space at the Recreation Ground, installed an irrigation system at the Recreation Ground for watering of the bowling green and cricket wicket/outfield, installed electricity and new pump to the historic fountain at the village pond on Parkside Drive, provided x4 new benches on the bowling green at the Recreation Ground, carried out extensive drainage works to the bowling green and purchased the beautiful wood sculptures that form the sculpture trail at Catton Park (our thanks to Friends of Catton Park for providing funding towards one of the sculptures). We have also secured funding through the Broadland Trees Grant for the purchase of x10 historic fruit tress which will create a small community orchard at Woodham Leas, the planting of which will take place in the Autumn. Our thanks to Norfolk County Councillor Karen Vincent for providing additional funding towards this project also.

Throughout the year the Council has strongly supported our community. We continue to support the Royal British Legion and provided display window for art as part of the Remembrance Art Trail held in October. We supported Catton Park by hosting the annual Garage Sale in August, carried out x2 Community Litter Picks (our thanks to those who took part) in June, supported Friends of Catton Park by selling calendars and greeting cards, tickets for the Easter Egg Hunt and Open Gardens event. The Council has supported Norfolk Support Ukraine UK by providing a local collection point for the for the community for donations.

We continue to support the youth of our Parish through Sprowston Youth Engagement Project (SYEP) via the Old Catton Youth Group and via BLAH and supporting the Old Catton youth football team who practise at the Recreation Ground on Thursday evenings, by supporting youth netball through the weekly practise sessions and matches of Thoroughbred Netball held at the Recreation Ground and we look forward to welcoming the Dynamos Cricket youth group who will be starting at the Recreation Ground from early May. We are proud to provide continued support to Old Catton Junior Football Club who use the Parish Council owned site at Lavaré Park.

With Spring upon us we look forward to welcoming our sports groups back to the Recreation Ground. With all covid restrictions lifted the x₃ bowling clubs will finally be able to use the bowls hut once again. Cricket season is just about to start with full use of facilities at the Recreation Ground and netball season has already started. It is wonderful to see such a diversity of usage at the Recreation Ground and a pleasure to see so many families enjoying the open space.

Looking forward to next year and with the G7 Summit in Cornwall and declaration of climate crisis in mind the Parish Council will be looking into carbon neutrality, net zero and ways to make Old Catton more sustainable. This will be an enormous project that will need the support of all residents. More information will follow.

We would like to thank Norfolk County and Broadland District Councillor Karen Vincent and Broadland District Councillor Ken Leggett for their continued hard work and dedication to Old Catton and collaboration with the Parish Council for improvements to the Parish. Through discussion with the Parish Council, Councillor Karen Vincent has been instrumental in positively improving highways, green spaces and facilities within Old Catton. Councillor Ken Leggett continues to positively support the Parish Council and Catton Park Trust through improvement of green spaces and fund raising for the Park. They have provided a valued extension of the Parish Council and have made a significant impact to our Parish.

Our final thanks must go to our grounds staff. Our Head Groundsman, Ross, has worked tirelessly to improve the quality of the green spaces in our community. Ross and Chris have finished the mammoth job of completing the drainage works to the bowling green for which the Council thanks them for their efforts – this turned into a much larger job than was originally envisaged. The grounds staff team are to be commended for the work they carry out at all the spaces the Council are responsible for – the Cemetery, the Churchyard, Woodham Leas, the War Memorial, Lavaré Park and the Recreation Ground. We are sure all residents will agree that Old Catton remains a beautiful and well-maintained village.



Finally, I would personally like to thank my fellow Councillors and the Council staff for their continued support, advice and hard work and look forward to their proactive contributions for the next year on behalf of the village and the Council.

OLD CATTON JUNIOR FOOTBALL TEAM

Having lost out on the conclusion of the 2019/20 season and then highly restricted training and then matches and then yet more lockdown it is with great pleasure that as I write this, lockdowns have been lifted and we can accommodate all of our regular football activity in what amounts to business as usual at Old Catton JFC. Since March of 2020, two seasons and effectively two summers of tournaments and celebrations have been lost to the pandemic which has made us more determined than ever before to ensure the summer of 2022 showcases our club and celebrates the young people that represent it.

That said, during the pandemic, Old Catton JFC was far from idle. At Lavare Park, static floodlights were installed to enable evening training, an under-pitch sprinkler system and improvements to our pitches were made. All achieved in-house by club members for the benefit of our young players. The Parish Council have also been very helpful in this regard granting the club funds to purchase a set of brand new portable goals ensuring we have the very best equipment on all our pitches, the envy of many other clubs. Next season will, hopefully, see further additions to the club's infrastructure as we strive to ensure local children have the very best facilities with which to enhance their enjoyment of playing our national winter game.

Our membership of young players has, despite the lockdown pause (and the competing attraction of computer games), held up remarkably well and many of our teams are full. In addition, we have recently introduced girls only football to Old Catton JFC having become a FA Wildcats centre with regular Friday tea-time sessions led by an accredited ladies coach. This has proven to be very successful with around 20 – 25 girls aged between 6 and 10 enjoying their football every week, some of whom also join the boys in mixed teams (all football under 16 and

younger is mixed). The 2021/22 season has also seen one of our largest ever intakes of under 6 footballers (school year 1) enjoying weekly Saturday morning sessions at Lavare Park and we look forward to our 2022/23 intake in September. ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

It was a busy year for the Old Catton RBL. At the end of February 2021 we formed our first committee and became a standalone branch after being supported by the county for the last few years. We've spent the past year getting to know some of our forces families and beneficiaries, and we're still working away behind the scenes making phone calls and visiting, and looking after our more vulnerable beneficiaries.

In October, we launched our first Remembrance Art Trail, kindly supported by Morrisons, Camilla Brides, Oyster Travel, J&P Fish and Chips and Old Catton Parish Council who all displayed artwork submitted by schools, scout groups, individuals, and the residents from a local care home. We asked for artwork to represent what "REMEMBRANCE" means to you, we were blown away by the thought-provoking and often poignant submissions. It is so important to keep the act of personal and shared remembrance alive and to kindle that flame in our young people as they will be the guardians of Remembrance in the future. From what I saw of their thoughts and ideas in their artwork, it is safe in their hands.



Our Poppy Appeal raised an amazing £5073.65 thanks to your generosity. A big thank you to all our Poppy Appeal Volunteers – despite Lindsay and some of the volunteers having Covid, everyone rallied round and we had Morrisons covered most of the time. At The RBL Norfolk County Conference, Old Catton were awarded the Carter Trophy of our fundraising efforts during the Poppy Appeal and for our projects to raise awareness of the work of the Legion, when we had the 100th Birthday Walking Trail last Spring. Thank you to all of you who support our efforts.



We've just held our second successful Quiz and Chips Night, which we plan on becoming a permanent fixture in our calendar and looking ahead, we have other activities planned throughout the year for our members and beneficiaries including a tour of the old RAF Coltishall and a trip to the National Memorial Arboretum. One of our committee members, Neil, has put together a walking/cycling/driving route of all of the Commonwealth War Graves and Grade 2 listed war memorials in the area. Starting locally with Old Catton, and then further afield throughout Norfolk. If you would like a copy, we will make it available on our Facebook page, by request from one of the committee and at the Parish Council Office. We will also be partnering with Park Run on Armed Forces Day (Saturday 25th June). We're encouraging Park Run participants to wear something with a nod to the Armed Forces and we will be there with an information point and some deliciously icy cool refreshment for the runners!

May sees the 40th anniversary of the Falklands conflict and the Norwich Aviation Museum is holding an event on Sunday the 22nd May between 10am and 5pm; You'll have the chance to get up close and personal to Falklands era aircraft, like the Vulcan and Nimrod and there will be historical re-enactors, equipment and displays. The event will also showcase various displays illustrating the role the Royal Air Force played during the conflict and a number of former personnel from the Vulcan, Victor and Nimrod crews will be present to share their experiences. In addition, military re-enactment groups will add authenticity to the day with a rapier missile battery – the type used to defend Port Stanley Airfield on display. The museum's Lightning, Phantom and Jaguar cockpits will also be open. Tickets are only available on the door.

In mid-April we had a General Meeting of the Old Catton RBL, its committee, members and guests which included three of the County Officers. The highlight of the evening was being able to honour John Arnott, and Old Catton resident and former Parish Councillor, for over 30 years of service during the Poppy Appeal and Remembrance fortnight. As well as volunteering to be one of our in-store collectors, he also organises the wreath-laying at the war memorial and reads out the roll of honour of the Old Catton fallen. He exemplifies the Legion's motto of SERVICE NOT SELF. The world always needs people like John Arnott, and we can always use more volunteers! CATTON PARK TRUST

This year saw the Trust reopen the doors of Buxton Lodge for regular hire and educational visits following the lifting of some covid restrictions. The Park welcomed back the Brownies groups, home education, fitness classes and a new art group. Scouts, Cubs and Air Cadets now regularly use the outdoor space. Wellbeing, fitness and bootcamp classes continue to take place within the Park and we welcomed the return of ParkRun. It has been lovely to see our regularly users and hirers back using the facilities and enjoying the beautiful green space.

Footfall remains high with the Park continuing to be the place of choice for the local community and those living in Norwich and the outskirts. Walkers, runners, cyclists, dog walkers and, with the improved weather, picnickers continue to enjoy the space – we would ask that you all be mindful of the other users; take your litter home, always clear up after your dog and be respectful of others, to ensure everyone has an enjoyable experience at Catton Park.

This year we said welcome to Carey's of Norfolk who provide refreshments weekly during the day, Thursday—Sunday. There is a lovely community feel around the users of the Café. May we ask that users use the rubbish bins and not dog bins when disposing of your coffee cups, or consider reusable cups.



With such extensive usage we are proud to say that the management of the park and woodland continues to be carried out to an impressive standard and we thank Matt Caley (Warden) and Amy Henderson (Park Assistant) for their tireless dedication. Tree and shrub planting, woodland management, grass cutting, fencing and path maintenance and extensive litter picking continues to be carried out. Our thanks also to the regular volunteers who provide additional help with the maintenance and to those unknown ad-hoc litter pickers who help to keep the Park looking at its best. Going into 2022 a new hoggin path is being installed in an effort to reduce the wear and tear on the parkland by the increased footfall.

We thank the Parish Council for providing funding (via S106) and the Friends of Catton Park for their donation towards the magnificent Sculpture Trail at the Park. These fabulous sculptures add character to the Park; those who have not yet followed the Sculpture Trail will find the map on our website: <u>https://www.cattonpark.com/walkers-trails/sculpture-trail.html</u>. Plans for next year include the installation of a brass rubbing educational trail in the east woodland and Information board detailing the Buxton family history in Old Catton.

Sadly, due to covid restrictions few events took place this year but those that did had their successes! Strange Fascination performed the amazing Treasure Island open air theatre in July and were featured on Radio Norfolk's Treasure Hunt. The Lantern Parade in October was a huge success and our thanks go to the Friends of Catton Park for organising this event. Spooks in the Park took everyone by surprise as being the only local fireworks event on that particular weekend – there were some positives and negatives to the event and these will be taken forward with future planning.

During 2022, we will be hosting an Upcycling Craft Fair in May and will be taking part in the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations with Picnic in the Park and the lighting of the Beacon in June. Matt and Amy are hoping to run some educational events – flora and fauna walks, bat walks, etc – later in the year; more details to follow.

The financial cost of running Catton Park continues to be at the forefront of the Trust's mind. Whilst large scale events raise substantial funds towards running costs, the Trust must consider the impact on the Park and local community of hosting such events. Small scale events will never raise sufficient funds and grant funding is only available for specific projects and not general running costs.

We do continue to raise funds from the recycle banks located around the village (Morrisons, the Woodman PH, the Maids Head PH) and at The Rectory Crostwick. Gross funds raised this year (February and March funds not yet received) are $\pounds_{3,307,00}$ and the Trust thanks you for continuing to support Catton Park through recycling your glass bottles and paper at the banks rather than placing them in your grey bin. Our sincere thanks to Ken Leggett for the continued management of this fund raiser.

A series of Members Open Gardens was again organised from May – September, all run within the Covid guidance which were very successful and enjoyed by many members.

The Club has continued to attract new members during the past year and this, combined with Covid guidance made it clear that we needed more space and a permanent move for monthly meetings to St Margaret's Church Hall was agreed although this also meant meeting on Friday evenings rather than Wednesdays.

Members of one of the longest-established bowls club in the parish are looking forward to the new season with great enthusiasm. While Catton Bowls Club has a loyal but small membership, there's plenty of opportunity to take up this under-rated outdoor activity.

We initially started at Waterloo park, moved to Jarrolds sports social club and then to Old Catton Recreation ground after Jarrolds closed the site. We were very grateful to Wensum Bowls Club and Old Catton Parish Council who have been very helpful and supportive of our club.

We are family friendly and inclusive. Our membership currently consists of both male and female, experienced players and beginners, teenagers to pensioners. We are looking for new members who are interested in returning to bowls or who would just like to try something new we have plenty of experienced players who would be willing to help and advise you!

WHAT IS A PARISH COUNCIL?

A parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish and has an overall responsibility for the wellbeing of its local community. It is the level of government closest to the community and is invariably the first place people will go with concerns or ideas.

Parish Councils make all kinds of decisions on issues that affect the local community. Probably the most common topics that parish councils get involved with are planning matters (they are statutory consultees), crime prevention, helping local groups, managing open spaces and campaigning for and delivering better services and facilities.

It is true that on their own parish councils have limited powers to make decisions but they have the ability to negotiate with, and the power to influence, those other organisations that do make the final decisions (such as District Council, police, etc).

DO YOU KNOW WHAT YOUR COUNCIL DOES FOR YOUR PARISH?

Your Parish Council has a number of responsibilities within the Parish - are you aware what they are?

Around the Parish your Parish Council are responsible for:

- the maintenance of most of the green spaces within Old Catton. This includes the Recreation Ground on Church Street, Lavaré Park on Buxton Road and Woodham Leas green area. At the Church Street site this includes the management and maintenance the Pavilion and of all sports and recreation facilities including the bowling green, cricket pitches, netball and tennis courts, multi-use games area (MUGA) and the children's play areas. At Lavaré Park, which is on a long-term lease to Old Catton Junior Football Club, this includes the children's play area, green space and car park at Austin Way.
- the management and maintenance of Old Catton Cemetery, the War Memorial and the maintenance of St Margaret's Churchyard.
- the maintenance of the bus stops on White Woman Lane, The Paddocks (at Morrisons), Lodge Lane and St Faiths Road (near Garrick Green).
- the noticeboards on St Faiths Road, Church Street, George Hill, Norman Drive and the corner of White Woman Lane.
- maintenance of most of the streetlighting around the Parish.
- maintenance of grass verges around the Parish.
- maintenance of the cat and the barrel village sign.
- maintenance of memorial benches around the village.


Through the Parish Charity your Parish Council also provides support to the Allotments on Spixworth Road and through Catton Park Trust the Parish Council supports the maintenance of Catton Park.

Your Parish Council also provides consultation on planning applications, crime matters, provide support and guidance to local groups/societies/organisations. Your Council also provides support to the youth of the Parish through facilities at the Recreation Ground for the Old Catton Youth Club and Lavaré Park for Old Catton Junior Football Club.

Being a Councillor is a voluntary position. It is a tireless and thankless job – many residents complain, few compliment. Councillors, many still in full time employment, give their time freely to improve the quality of life in the Parish.

MESSAGE FROM PC GRAHAM GILL

This year I have mainly been concentrating on the priorities set by members of the public and the local councillors. The priorities have mostly remained the same during the year, concentrating on speeding and anti-social behaviour.



I am pleased to say that, although there has been some anti-social behaviour in Old Catton, it has remained low. Crime figures for the Old Catton area remain at a very low level.

To combat anti-social behaviour, we have been conducting hi-visibility and plain-clothed patrols both in vehicles and on foot. We have been conducting speed checks and I am liaising with partner agencies to see what else we can do in the 20mph limits, which still give local residents cause for concern. This will be an ongoing project.

With the country now returning to 'normal' since the Covid Pandemic, we have been conducting engagement surgeries. Members of the public are encouraged to speak with me about their local concerns. We will be conducting surgeries at least once per month and these are advertised on local social media sites.

If, however, you do have any concerns you do not have to wait for the engagement surgeries to tell me - you can always contact me on <u>sntsprowston@norfolk.police.uk</u>. Alternatively, please stop me when you see me out and about. I would also encourage you to report crime and anti-social behaviour to the police - this is really important so that we can prioritise our patrol areas.

Not only did we do this, support each other and strengthen our friendships, but quite a few of us now look back and realise we've become pretty good at using Zoom and doing other 'techy' things we wouldn't have even thought about before Covid-19. As someone who helps with the delivery of newsletters etc, I also reflect on how much I've enjoyed visiting Catton Park more often, as well as getting to know footpaths, lokes and short cuts ... my step count is up!

After a winter of lockdown Zooms and phone calls followed by a 'careful' spring, July 5th 2021 marked our first WI get-together: we held a picnic at the Recreation Ground to mark NHS & Key Workers' Day.

Sincere thanks to Gail Howes at the Parish Council for her assistance – and for lending us the key to the 'facilities, of course!

Many members had knitted trauma teddies for children caught up in hospital admissions and other emergencies; some had also created twiddle muffs to help people suffering with restless' forms of dementia.

We invited Carol Plunkett, Charity Lead at the Norfolk Community Health and Care NHS Trust, to come and tell us about her role and collect the teddies and twiddle muffs for distribution. Her brief talk was engaging and interesting, we were lucky with the weather .. and it was SO good to be able to meet in person, albeit in a group of 30 max whilst maintaining social distance.

Of course, we'd also like to think that our committee members provided some unexpected entertainment for mid-morning joggers and strollers as we put up our gazebo ...

After this we held two garden parties and the last of our 'remote' monthly meetings. We re-started our meetings in the Village Hall in October 2021. We've been careful: masks, distancing, hand sanitiser, limited raffle arrangements, piano playing but no singing ... Even with these restrictions, it is still wonderful to be back – although some of us are still shielding, so newsletters, Zooms and phone calls will continue.

Members agreed to let winter colds, flu and Norovirus have their day, aiming to get back to normal from April 2022 – at the time of writing, we look forward to our first meeting without restrictions: singing, birthday posies, sale tables and other traditional features of our WI meetings will start again. We meet on the third Wednesday evening of each month; new members are always welcome ... everyone can attend up to three meetings before deciding whether our WI is right for them.
