We are also delighted to introduce x3 new members of staff to our team. Vanessa Middleton has joined us as Administration Officer and has already become an indispensable member of the team. You have probably seen Tabitha Blomfield, our new

Catton Park Assistant, getting her hands dirty and making an impact around the Park. Last but not least we welcome Graham Gill as our new Groundsman – be sure to say hello when you spot him out and about. Each of them brings a wealth of skills and experience and we are confident they will further enhance our already successful team. We look forward to the contributions they will make as we continue to grow and thrive.

We recently said farewell and thank you to our Groundsman, Neil Shiach who left us at the end of June. We also extend our thanks and best wishes to Jean Vincent, who originally joined us for just two weeks to cover admin duties — and stayed for an amazing 15 months! We are truly grateful for the contributions Neil and Jean have made to the Parish and we wish them every health and happiness for the future.

We are thrilled to announce that planning permission has been granted for the redevelopment of facilities at Lavaré Park. The brand-new Clubhouse will deliver long overdue upgrades for Old Catton Junior Football Club, including modern changing rooms, first aid and referee rooms, a kitchen, and improved toilet facilities. A spacious meeting room — with capacity for around 150 people — will also provide the much needed community hub residents have been calling for in the north of the Parish. We are committed to building a Clubhouse that meets carbon literacy standards, using eco-friendly materials, and incorporating solar panels, heat source pumps, and recycled air systems. Our consultants are now refining the approved plans ready for the project to go out to tender — and we can't wait to break ground later this year! Meanwhile, planning permission for the Pavilion redevelopment at the Recreation Ground is still pending, and we hope to see it approved in the coming weeks. Regarding the development of land near Morrisons and Lavaré Park (part of the Beeston Park project), the Parish Council has not yet received any updates. We know these developments will have a significant impact on Old Catton, particularly on housing and local services like schools and surgeries. Please rest assured: the Council will keep all residents informed and will invite everyone to a Public Consultation as soon as updates are available.

The Council is delighted to continue supporting the vibrant youth in our community! Whether it's grassroots football at Lavaré Park with Old Catton Junior Football Club, youth netball with Thoroughbreds Netball, or Dynamos Cricket with Old Catton Cricket Club both held at the Recreation Ground — there's something for every young person to

get excited about. We're also incredibly proud to back the amazing work of Sprowston Youth Engagement Project (SYEP), offering a wide range of programs in Old Catton, including a Youth Group, LGBTQ+ Group, and youth football teams. The future's bright, and we're here to help make it happen!

Catton Park continues to thrive as a beloved community space, with footfall continuing to increase as more people discover its beauty and heritage. Our ongoing commitment to preserving the Park's historic charm remains strong as we continue to carefully manage the Park within the legacy of Repton's design. We are very pleased to work together with the Friends of Catton Park in the creation of the Friends Legacy Project which has seen the planting of disease-resistant elm trees, generously donated by John Innes Centre, and we continue to prioritise sustainable practices and support biodiversity. To learn more about the Park, stay updated and discover all the ways Catton Park continues to grow as a vibrant and sustainable community asset visit the website: www.cattonpark.com.

Looking ahead to 2025/26, the Council is gearing up for the exciting planning work needed to extend Old Catton Cemetery. This expansion will include Parish Council land to the west of the current site, creating much-needed space for more burial and cremation plots. While this project will take time — with thorough ground water surveys needed to ensure suitability — we're optimistic that the new area will be ready within the next couple of years. Meanwhile, planning for improvements to the Deer Park will kick off. Plans include new fencing, tree planting, and information board(s) on the horizon (funding towards the boards is made possible by funds donated from the DPAG). But first, we'll be diving into the review of the Old Catton Neighbourhood Plan. A dedicated Steering Group of local volunteers has already formed, and they'll be working to improve and update the existing Plan. Keep an eye out for consultation documents coming to your door in the next few months — your input on this review is absolutely vital! All of these projects come with significant funding needs, and we're actively exploring various funding sources to bring them to life.

Finally, are you aware of the Norfolk and Suffolk Devolution Plan? The Government's Devolution Plan is coming to Norfolk and Suffolk, aiming to bring more power and funding to local communities. This means a directly elected mayor overseeing vital areas like transport, housing, and economic growth. The plan also proposes replacing the current two-tier local government system (this being County and District Councils) with unitary authorities, saving millions. Parish Councils will not be affected. Broadland District Council are already running a public consultation to hear your views — so now's your chance to have your say. These changes could be in place by 2026, shaping our future for years to come. Don't miss out — get involved and help shape the direction of our region! We close this report by shining a well-deserved spotlight on the outstanding work of our grounds staff, led by Head Groundsman Ross and Park Warden Matt. A huge personal thank you to Ross, Matt, Chris for their incredible dedication over the past year and to Tabby, and Graham for their enthusiasm over the past few months.

All that remains is to personally thank my fellow Councillors (both old and new) and the Council staff for their unwavering support, expert advice, and tireless hard work. I am excited for what we have already achieved and what we can achieve together in the coming year for the Parish and the Council. I would like to give a special thanks to Sarah for her exceptional help and support over the past year — her commitment continues to be invaluable to us all.

Message from PC Darryl Robinson

I would like to introduce myself as the new Beat Manager for Sprowston and Old Catton. I have just transferred from the Response role after 11 years of working the Broadland area.



I am keen to hear from anyone who has concerns to raise in regard to the local community. I want to ensure Old Catton remains a friendly, safe place to live and work all year round. To do this, I work in partnership with local organisations such as councils, businesses, and schools to tackle any issues that arise, take part in regular community events, and work on the priorities for the area, voted on by residents.

One of the priorities often nominated is road safety. Several measures, including increased speed checks, road safety operations and bicycle safety campaigns have been completed in the last year to tackle the issue, and I will continue to raise awareness and enforce safety for all road users.

Another priority regularly adopted is anti-social behaviour. There can sometimes be increased reports over the warmer months, but aim to keep this to a minimum with Park Walk Talks and high-visibility patrols of residential areas and open spaces. OLD CATTON HORTICULTURAL CLUB

The Old Catton Horticultural Club had another very successful year last year and maintained a high membership. We held eight monthly talks with a variety of speakers all of which were well attended with an average audience of about 55 members and visitors. We also held two Shows, a Summer one last August and a Spring Show this April both of which were well attended by non-members coming to view the exhibits.



We also organised a day coach trip to Bury St Edmunds, visiting the Abbey Gardens in the morning and Fuller's Mill Gardens in the afternoon and also had 2 afternoon visits to local gardens. Our annual Plant and Cake Sale in May raised over £900 which will ensure we can cover the increasing costs of speakers, hall hire, etc. In December we held a Christmas Social with a buffet and a performance from the Hellesdon Community Choir. We produce a monthly newsletter which is delivered by email or in person to ensure that all members are kept informed about the club's activities.





A group of our members and others from the local community have continued to maintain the Community Orchard on Oakfield Gardens, near Swansgate. In September we held a bulb planting day and over 850 bulbs were planted by 24 people ranging from 11 months to 89 years old! The results have been very pleasing to see this Spring. The fruit trees are all making good growth and should produce more fruit this autumn. The hedging is gradually becoming more established. An interpretation board and an additional bench should soon enhance the area through a Pride in Place grant supported by the Parish Council, the BDC and Councillor, Karen Vincent. An apple and pear pruning workshop was held in January and we hope to hold another for the Cherries and plums in the Summer.



This year we have over 84 members so far and have a full programme of talks which are held on the first Friday of most months to which visitors are always welcome at a cost of £2.50. We will be holding another Plant and Cake Sale at The Village Hall on Saturday 17th May 10am -12.30pm which is open to all. On June 18th having a day Coach Trip to Cambridge Botanic Gardens jointly with Hellesdon Horticultural Society and the Social sub-committee is organising an afternoon tea for members in August.

None of this could happen without the help of an active and committed committee and several willing additional members.

We are thankful for the help of the Parish Council in carrying out works to the hall in upgrading the lights to more environmentally friendly LEDs and updating the toilet facilities.

The church continues to publish 'The Magazine' which includes information not just about the church but also on various other groups in Old Catton and the work of the parish council, local businesses and contact numbers that may be useful to know. The monthly magazine is still only 60p and you can pick up a copy in church or you can pay an annual subscription to have it delivered.

Like many organisations the church struggles with finances as we rely solely on donations and fees for weddings and funerals, so it is a constant battle to keep the church going so that it is available for everyone including future generations.

Our regular weekly services on Wednesday 10am and Sunday 8am and 10am take place and the church is also open during the day so that people can come and find a quiet place to sit to be still and perhaps light a candle in prayer.

We hope that the church will remain a place of peace and support for the people of Old Catton and a part of the life of the community.

WHAT DOES THE PARISH COUNCIL DO?

Old Catton Parish Council serves a population of 6,241 people. There are currently 10 Councillors (all volunteers) who represent the entire Parish. The services provided by the Parish Council includes the upkeep of the Recreation Ground, maintenance of the cemetery and closed churchyard, War Memorial, village sign, Catton Park, Deer Park, green spaces, allotments, street lighting, bus shelters, grass verges.

Parish Council meetings are held on the 2nd Monday of the month at 6.30pm in the Pavilion at the Recreation Ground. All residents are welcome to attend these meetings to hear about the Council's plans and activities and there is an opportunity for members of the public to speak. A copy of the monthly Agenda is posted on our website and on the village noticeboards.

County Conference Recognition

The annual Norfolk County Conference was held at County Hall in Norwich on Saturday 1st February. We were very pleased to have the Legion's new Director General, Mark Atkinson, in attendance. He gave an encouraging and very positive address.

Another standout and inspirational speaker was Andrew Taylor, the Armed Forces Commissioner for Norfolk. He was blown up in Afghanistan and flown home for treatment at Headley Court. On returning to normal life, he suffered major setbacks and ultimately became homeless. With the help and support of the Legion, he was rehoused and was able to overcome his challenges. Thanks to his advice, we have been able to help a local veteran into secure, safe and comfortable housing.





County Youth Standard Bearer Competition

On the 19th of October last year, five nervous looking cadets turned up to Dereham Cadet Hall to compete for the honour of being the Principal County Youth Standard Bearer for Norfolk. 1 Royal Marine Cadet, 1 Sea Cadet (both from TS Lord Nelson - Norwich Sea Cadets) and 3 Army Cadets. Marine Cadet Oscar Selway took first place, with his fellow cadet from TS Lord Nelson Ewan Corless, a member of the Old Catton Branch, a close runner-up. 

Many of you may already know that the elms of Britain are under threat from Dutch Elm Disease, a devastating fungal disease spread by elm bark beetles. The Friends are delighted to be involved in a project which is aiming to produce some disease resistant trees. Over 50 elm whips (young trees) have been planted in an area near the picnic area along with some native trees. We hope that some of these elm trees will mature and be disease resistant. As part of our 20th anniversary legacy project the Friends have provided some more mature trees which have been planted in the north east of the park.

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN JOINING OLD CATTON PARISH COUNCIL?



Old Catton Parish Council serves a population of 6,100 people (Census 2011). There are x13 Councillors who represent the entire Parish.

The Parish Council is responsible for setting the annual precept and these funds are used to provide Parish services, including the Recreation Ground, the Cemetery, Lavaré Park, bus stops, street lighting, Catton Park, Deer Park, the War Memorial and the maintenance of the closed churchyard, green space at Woodham Leas, various bus shelters, x8 noticeboards around the Parish and the Village Sign. Additionally, the Council undertakes the highway verge cutting via an agency agreement with Norfolk County Council.

A Councillor is a member of the Council and is normally elected for a term of x4 years. People of any political or religious persuasion are eligible to become a Councillor, although their personal views should not extend into their Parish Council work. Next election will take place in May 2027 and all Parish Councillors will go through an election process. If there are any vacancies following election individuals can be co-opted onto the Council instead.

Becoming a Parish Councillor is a rewarding and valued form of public service.

All Councillors contribute to the work of the Parish Council by:

- Having a say about the things they care about;
- Putting forward ideas for better services;
- Responding to the needs and views of parishioners;
- Seeking the best outcome to local issues;
- Getting involved in decision making;
- Helping to make Old Catton a better place to live;

The Parish Council normally meet on the second Monday of the month, meetings commence at 6.30pm at The Pavilion, Recreation Ground, Church Street. Old Catton. Councillors are expected to attend meetings on a regular basis. These are public meetings and perspective councillors are welcome to attend.
